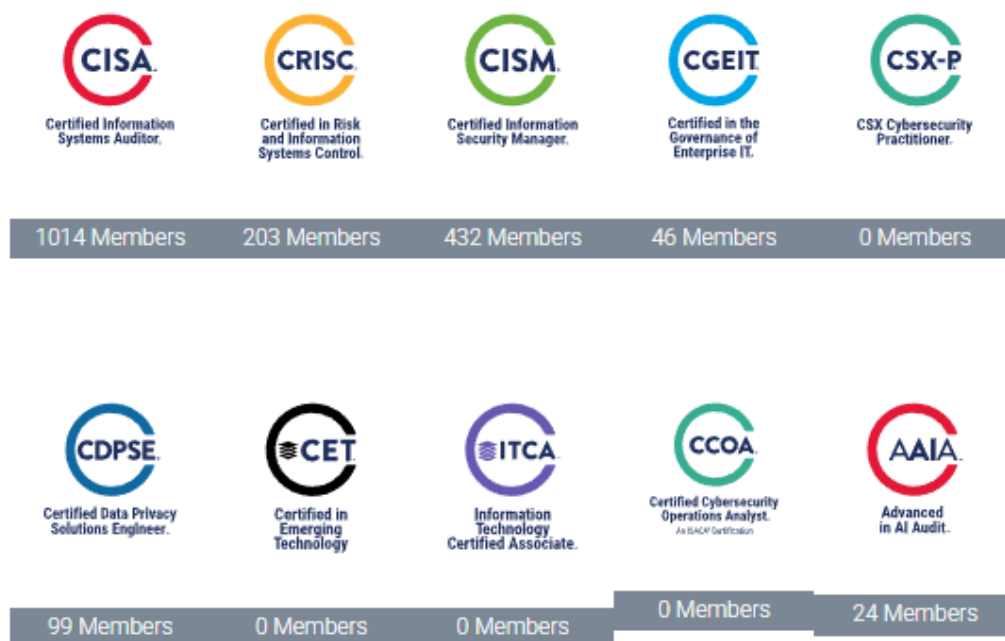


Credentials Held by Chapter Members

In a world shaped by disruptive innovation and human-driven decision-making, Governance, Risk, and Compliance (GRC) were no longer just about processes—they were about people and innovation leading the way. As organizations grappled with technological evolution, cyber threats, regulatory shifts, and climate risks, success lay in empowering leaders, fostering a risk-intelligent culture, and leveraging innovation for resilience.

At ISACA Chennai Conference 2025 (ICC 2025), we brought together risk leaders, cybersecurity professionals, legal experts, board members, and governance specialists to explore how organizations can drive excellence by harnessing People and Innovation in GRC.

Through thought-provoking keynotes, strategic dialogues, and expert panels, the conference redefined how organizations Anticipate, Assess, and Adapt to emerging challenges.

Key Focus Areas:

- People-Driven Governance – Strengthening leadership, accountability, and decision-making
- Innovation & Digital Trust – Building confidence in digital ecosystems
- Strategic Oversight & The Three Lines Model – The Board’s role in shaping governance excellence
- Enterprise Risk & Agility – Integrating risk strategy with business transformation
- Cyber Law & Compliance – Adapting to evolving regulatory landscapes
- AI & Emerging Tech – Governing innovation while mitigating AI risks

4. ISACA Chennai Conference 2026

ISACA Chennai Conference 2026 (ICC 2026), themed “**Build. Assure. Trust. (BAT) – Governing Cognitive Intelligence**”, we brought together governance leaders, risk professionals, technologists, policymakers, lawyers, and industry experts to explore how organizations can scale intelligence responsibly while sustaining trust.

Drawing inspiration from the Seven Chakras (Themes for Global Cooperation) from the AI Impact Summit 2026 — spanning data, models, systems, governance, ethics, and societal impact, the conference offered a structured yet holistic lens to navigate the lifecycle of cognitive systems.

A key emphasis was on governing AI, where systems operate with increasing autonomy, demanding new models of oversight, accountability, and control aligned with OECD AI principles.

This conference was anchored in a simple yet powerful idea: **Intelligence must be built with intent, assured with rigor, and trusted through accountability.**

The conference was held on **August 7 & 8** featuring **two parallel tracks**, enabling deeper exploration across governance, risk, security, and innovation. This was complemented by **three pre-conference workshops on August 6**, offering hands-on, practitioner-focused

learning to equip participants with actionable frameworks for governing AI and emerging technologies.

Through thought-provoking keynotes, strategic dialogues, and expert-led sessions, ICC 2026 redefined how organizations approached the lifecycle of intelligent systems balancing innovation with responsibility, autonomy with oversight, and efficiency with ethics in an increasingly AI driven world.

- **Build. Assure. Trust:** was not just a framework, but a shared lens to examine the evolving landscape of cognitive intelligence:

Together, these perspectives moved us beyond technology—into the realm of governed cognitive intelligence, where innovation is balanced with responsibility, and autonomy is guided by control.

This was not about prescribing answers.

It was about asking better questions:

- What does it take to trust intelligent and autonomous systems?
- How do we ensure accountability at scale in an agent-driven world?
- Where does responsibility truly lie when machines begin to decide?

Because the future of intelligence will not be defined by what we build alone – but by what we choose to assure, and ultimately, what we are willing to trust.

8. SIG (Special Interest Group)

Special Interest Groups – Programme Purpose, Management and Progress

Programme Purpose – Special Interest Groups

The Special Interest Groups (SIGs) are a focused and member-driven learning initiative designed to nurture professional interests through structured knowledge sharing, collaborative discussions, research, and peer learning. The SIGs provide a platform for members to deepen their technical expertise, exchange practical industry experiences, explore emerging technologies and regulatory developments, and develop a broader strategic perspective on issues shaping the cybersecurity profession.

The SIGs operate as volunteer-led groups, encouraging members not only to participate as learners but also to contribute as knowledge creators and presenters to create a powerful and sustainable learning ecosystem.

The current SIG programme covers four areas of strategic importance: Security Operations, Data Protection and DPDPA, Quantum Computing and Cryptography, and Enterprise and Responsible AI. Together, these areas address both current cybersecurity priorities and emerging technologies.

Programme Management

The SIG programme was initiated at the beginning of the year following an invitation to chapter members to voluntarily enrol in areas aligned with their professional interests and learning objectives. The four focus areas were communicated to members through a structured registration process, enabling participants to identify their preferred SIG and commit time towards continuous learning.

SIG Group A – Security Operations

The Security Operations SIG focuses on the operational aspects of cyber defence and organizational resilience. Key areas include Security Operations Centre (SOC) practices, threat detection and response, incident management, threat intelligence, cyber resilience, security monitoring, automation, and emerging security operations trends.

SIG Group B – Data Protection and DPDPA

The Data Protection and DPDPA SIG focuses on the rapidly evolving privacy and data protection landscape. The group explores data governance, privacy frameworks, regulatory compliance, GDPR, the Digital Personal Data Protection Act, privacy risk management, data breach management, and emerging privacy challenges.

SIG Group C – Quantum Computing and Cryptography

The Quantum Computing and Cryptography SIG team explores the fundamentals and potential impact of quantum technologies on cybersecurity. Topics include quantum computing fundamentals, real-world applications, quantum cryptography, post-quantum cryptography.

SIG Group D – Enterprise and Responsible AI

The Enterprise and Responsible AI SIG team focuses on the rapid adoption of Artificial Intelligence and its implications for organizations. The group explores AI governance, responsible and ethical AI, AI risk management, security, privacy, regulatory and compliance considerations, bias and fairness, transparency, and responsible enterprise adoption of AI.

SIG Group on Prompt Engineering was integrated into the AI Enterprise group in 2026. This group had many interesting sessions on importance of quality of good prompts and various techniques associated with them.

Member Participation and Engagement

The response from chapter members has been highly encouraging. Approximately 120 members expressed interest in participating in the SIG programme, with nearly 100 members committing to dedicate approximately 8–10 hours per month to their chosen SIG stream.

Learning Approach and guidelines

The Director – SIG has provided overall direction and a common framework for the four groups while allowing each SIG flexibility to develop its own detailed learning agenda.

A key feature of the programme has been its member-led learning approach.

SIG leaders were identified based on their professional experience, subject-matter expertise, and willingness to facilitate collaborative learning. The volunteer leadership

model has helped create a strong sense of ownership and accountability among participating members.

To facilitate effective communication and coordination, dedicated communication groups were established for each SIG. SIG leaders have supported participants by guiding topic selection, facilitating discussions, coordinating sessions, and encouraging active participation. Meetings have generally been conducted on a bi-monthly basis, with individual SIGs determining the specific week and timing based on member availability and interests.

Progress During the period of review

Over the past year (01Apr25 to 31 Mar 26), the SIG learning calendars have reflected the dedication, enthusiasm, and sustained involvement of participating members. The learning journey has largely been driven by member interests, with individuals taking ownership of specific topics and leading knowledge-sharing sessions. The initiative has now taken firm root within the Chapter and is steadily developing into a disciplined and sustainable professional learning platform.

Collectively, the four SIGs have conducted more than 40 sessions during the first six months, covering a diverse range of topics across cybersecurity, privacy, emerging technologies, and enterprise risk.

The programme has successfully established a culture of continuous learning, peer-to-peer knowledge exchange, and professional collaboration. It has also created opportunities for members to strengthen their presentation, research, analytical, and leadership skills while contributing to the development of the wider professional community.

Looking Ahead:

The SIG initiative will continue to evolve, with opportunities for greater cross-SIG collaboration, joint sessions, industry expert interactions, practical workshops, case-study

discussions, and knowledge-sharing initiatives. A full day conclave is planned for sharing the knowledge of the SIG teams with wider participation.

The strong participation and growing number of sessions demonstrate that the SIG programme has established a solid foundation for creating a vibrant, collaborative, and future-focused learning ecosystem within the ISACA Chennai Chapter.
